

"Bedlam"

This movie covers a topic of significant concern for many people in our community.; the mental healthcare crisis. The title of the documentary is "Bedlam" and here is the synopsis of the documentary as it appears in their promotional material:

Haunted by the death of a mentally ill sister, psychiatrist Ken Rosenberg takes on the role of filmmaker to examine a national health crisis. *Bedlam* follows the poignant stories of people grappling with schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, and other chronic psychiatric conditions. Impossible to mask when untreated, their symptoms shove them into the path of police officers, ER doctors and nurses, lawyers, and prison guards. Shooting over the course of five years, Rosenberg takes us inside Los Angeles County's overwhelmed and vastly under-resourced psych ER, a nearby jail warehousing thousands of psychiatric patients, and the homes — and homeless encampments — of people suffering from severe mental illness, where silence and shame often worsen the suffering.

We are hoping to have several panelists from our community participate in order to give relevance to the subject as it exists here in Walla Walla. So far, we have Sheriff Mark Crider and Sgt. Kevin Huxoll with the Walla Walla Police Dept. committed to being panelists. We also hope to have someone from the county jail and from the medical community who can comment on the availability of resources for treating patients with serious mental illness. 
